Church History

The Lord covenanted with the childless *Abram*, whose name means "exalted father" in Hebrew, that he would have a son. The Lord changed Abram's name to *Abraham*, meaning "the father of a multitude" (See BD Abraham). In 1835, Joseph Smith came across some Egyptian papyri and started translating them. The translation was first published in 1842 and later published as "The Book of Abraham" in *The Pearl of Great Price* in 1880. On LDS.org, it says:

This book ... recounts how Abraham sought the blessings of the priesthood, rejected the idolatry of his father, covenanted with Jehovah, married Sarai, moved to Canaan and Egypt, and received knowledge about the Creation.
